Communion by Intinction

With intinction, congregants will approach the communion servers from the center aisle to receive the bread with palms out; then, one should take the bread and dip it lightly into the juice.

After eating the bread, congregants are invited to spend time at the altar where you may be anointed by our clergy with frankincense, if one wishes, and/or visit one of the two prayer stations.


Congregants are welcome to light candles in memory of a loved one or as a sign of their prayer to God for the season.
